School Centered Program

Group psychotherapy and counseling to students in school settings. Students are referred by school staff, and other students. Sessions are built to address issues on communication, poor grades, truancy, violence, alcohol and drugs.

Neighborhood Centered Program

Assists youth gangs as whole entities; counseling provided to address issues dealing with families, alcohol and drug abuse, violence, education, relationships, etc.

Clinical Competency-Based Alternative Education (C-Base)

Offered as an alternative education program through the Farrington Community School for Adults. Students who found learning in a traditional classroom difficult and/or have dropped out have an opportunity to get a high school diploma.

High Risk Unlicensed Drivers Program

Helps young people driving without a license to obtain a license and acquire safe driving habits.

Student Transition Convention.

A statewide program assisting students with the transition from elementary to middle/intermediate school and from childhood to adolescence. The Annual Student Transition Convention happens each spring on Oahu and Neighbor Islands (Big Island, Kauai, and Maui).

Parenting Program

The program offers parent education and support classes, as well as assistance to teen parents.

Young Parent Groups

These groups work with pregnant and parenting mothers and fathers who are often in their teens. Groups focus on how to parent and the developmental needs of the adolescent parents. Service involves working with young parents in a group and individually.

Parent Education and Support Groups.

Groups are open for anyone to participate, and helps parents explore productive solutions to parenting concerns. Special emphasis is placed on how to parent adolescents.

Consultation, Presentations, Workshops.

Arrangements can be made covering a range of topics from the growth and development of infants and toddlers to parent and adolescent power struggles.

Arts, Culture, and an International 7-Aside Rugby Tournament.

Cultural & sports experiences targeted toward youth of Pacific island backgrounds.

Home visiting and group services to help keiki from birth through five years to love learning and do well in school. Services on five islands are free and can begin before the baby is born.

Native Hawaiian Child Care Assistance Project

Provides subsidies for children of parents who work or go to school to help ensure quality child care.

The Youth ATOD Prevention Project

Services for youth (and their parents) ages 10-17 on the dangers of substance abuse/use. Leadership training; alcohol, tobacco and other drug (ATOD) education; youth plan, organize and implement ATOD-free activities. Locations include Kaua`i, West Hawaii, Moloka`i, and Maui.

Ke Ala Ho`olōkahi Project

Services for Nanakuli youth 10-17 and their parents to educate them on the dangers of substance abuse/use.

Provides on-going substance free activities planned, organized and implemented by youth. The Project also works to improve the educational outcomes and career potential of Nanakuli 9th and 10th graders.

Ho'omāneā 'Ōiwi (Employment and Training)

Provides services including outreach, intake, assessment, career counseling, work experience, occupational skills training, educational & tuition assistance, tutoring and internships. Locations on Hawai'i, Maui, Kaua'i, Moloka'i, Lāna'i, and O'ahu.

Ka Ipu Kā'eo (Education and Training)

Services include outreach, intake, assessment, career counseling, occupational skills training, educational and tuition assistance, tutoring, and internships. Maritime Stewardship Program; Ola Ka Honua: Volcanoes Alive Project; Native Hawaiian Career and Technical Education Program; and the Hana Lima Scholarship.

Kūlia Like (Financial literacy)

Teaches individuals and families skills to make financial and survival decisions towards self-sufficiency. Services assist with Information and Referral resources, Individual Development Account savings opportunities, and financial literacy training. Locations on Hawai'i, Maui, Kaua'i, Moloka'i, Lāna'i, and O'ahu.

Kumu Kahi (Elderly Services Department)

Nutritional and supportive services for Native Hawaiian elderly, 60+, on the islands of Hawaii, Kauai, Maui, Molokai and Oahu. The Native American Caregivers Support Program is a pilot project designed to establish quality standards, user-friendly manuals and practical toolkits for family caregivers of Native Hawaiians.

Alternatives to Violence

Provides treatment and education services to perpetrators of violence. Includes group and individual therapy sessions focusing on anger management skills, understanding power and control dynamics, self-care, empathy and sensitivity to children, and communication and collaboration skills. The program emphasizes the importance of responsibility and accountability.

Provides 24-hour crisis intervention, counseling, medical, legal and judiciary advocacy for victims of sexual assault and their families. Other services include individual, couples and group therapy; case management services; legal systems advocacy. Program staff do presentations to the community about sexual assault and sexual abuse, and train professionals working with sexual assault victims.

Sex Offender Treatment Program

Works with court-referred adult offenders in need of treatment with the goal of reducing recidivism among sexual offenders and increase community safety. Treatment includes intensive group and individual therapy, psycho-educational services, and a relapse prevention model.

Youth Sexual Behavior Problems

The program's therapists provide cognitive behavioral therapy, victimization/trauma therapy, psycho-educational therapy and relapse prevention. Staff therapists also provide screening/evaluation, risk management, face-to-face interviews, record reviews, and individual and family therapy.

Education/Prevention

Staff can present to students at all educational levels, from preschool to university, on age-appropriate topics related to health, safety and sexuality. Additionally education and training to audiences including church groups, Rotary clubs, PTA groups, employers, police departments, and educator groups is possible.

Youth/Teen Services

Girlz Zone

Offers programs designed to develop and strengthen confidence, courage, strength and communication skills in girls from the ages of 9-15. Activities include alcohol, drug & tobacco education; building positive peer relationships, social development and competence.

Kauai Youth Network

A collaborative project between the Boys & Girls Club Hawaii - Kaua'i branch and the YWCA of Kaua'i. A diverse group of youth 14 – 21 years old will have an opportunity to be part of planning activities for youth on Kaua'i, and will have a forum to learn, act and develop as leaders.

Camp Sloggett

The site for many programs run by the YWCA, is rented to groups as a unit, and offers hostel accommodations for individual campers.
